



OAKE, SOMERSETSHIRE.

DEDICATION OF MEMORIAL BELLS.

The dedication of the two treble bells which have been presented to Oake parish church by Miss Lillie L. Broughton in memory of her mother, took place on a recent Saturday evening. The service was conducted by the Rural Dean, the Rev. W. F. Eustace, M.A., Vicar of Bishop's Lydyeard, who officiated in the place of the late Archdeacon Askwith, whilst the Rector (the Rev. J. R. Broughton), was also present. Previous to the restoration of the church, the tower only contained three bells, one of which, the tenor, was badly cracked. While the work was in progress, the bells were sent to Messrs. J. Warner and Sons, Cripplegate Foundry, London, where the tenor was recast, and the three were sent back with entire new fittings. The new cage put in by the builders to the design of the architect was, unfortunately, only erected for three bells, and considerable alterations with some difficulty had to be made before the additional cages for the two new bells could be fixed into the tower. As the old bells had been renovated by Messrs. Warner, it was thought desirable that the same firm should supply the two new bells, which they have done, with the result that Oake church now possesses a musical little ring of five bells, the tenor weighing 9 cwt. 1 qr. 7 lbs., and producing a note of a sharp G. The whole of the work was entrusted to Messrs. T. Doble and Son, bellhangers, of Taunton, who have carried it out in a very satisfactory manner.

The inscriptions on the new bells are as follows:-"These two bells are given by Lillie L. Broughton in memory of her mother, Louisa Broughton, died January 20th, 1911. R.I.P."

"Those evening bells, those evening bells, How many a tale their music tells Of youth and home and that sweet time When first I heard their soothing chime.

And so it will be when I am gone, Those evening bells will still ring on, When love and joy and life are fled, But hope lies buried with the dead." ' Henry T. Broughton, died August 7th, 1908."

The service opened with the hymn "Now thank we all our God," then followed two suitable collects and the chanting of the Magnificat. During the singing of Psalm exxii., the Rural Dean, the Rector, the churchwarden, and the ringers proceeded to the tower. Here the rector, aud then the churchwarden, handed the ropes to the Rev. W. F. Eustace, requesting him to dedicate the bells. After the dedicatory verses had been recited, the bells were rung by Messrs. Shartand, Langford, Winter, Mitchell, Bowden, Fry, and Broom. The Rural Dean, the Rector, and the churchwarden returned to their places during the chanting of Psalm cl. Then followed the hymn "O thanks to Thee, our gracious Lord," and suitable prayers. After the hymn "Hark, on high the joyful music," the Rural Dean gave an earnest address, in the course of which he said that right far back in the history of the Christian Church, bells had been used to bring men and women together to worship. In fact he churchwardens for the use of the bells and the school-

thought he was right in saying that bells were introduced by a Bishop as far back as the year 400. They were introduced into France about the middle of the sixth century, whilst handbells were used about that time. It was'a very good idea to use bells to summon men and women to worship, and from the single bell in the church in the quiet hamlet to the grand peal of the cathedral, all were used for that purpose. Without its bells a church was not considered fully equipped. The bells also pealed in joy and gladuess, as well as with a tale of sadness. He would remind them that the bells could only be legally rung with the consent of the Rector. The parishioners of Oake had much to be thankful for. Their house of God had been restored for His service, and the two new bells just dedicated, had been given by one in memory of a very dear friend. They should be thankful for the very satisfactory restoration. He had enjoyed his visit there that evening; it was a privilege to take part in the service, but they must remember that had it not been for the waps of God, which they could not understand, he would not have taken part in it. He, in fact the whole diocese, had lost a dear friend in the late Archdeacon Askwith. He had worked hard for the Saviour in Whose steps he had tried so earnestly to follow. Let them try and follow his example, as he had tried to follow the Master's.

After singing the hymn "Christ is our corner-stone." the service concluded with the Blessing.

BATH AND WELLS DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

Proceedings commenced with tea in the Church of England School at 4.30 p.m. In spite of the very unfavorable weather about thirty sat down to a most enjoyable tea, excellent arrangements for which had been made by Mrs. I. B. Holmyard. This pleasant function was presided over by the Rev. J. E. W. Honnywill, Vicar of Leigh-Mendip, who is the popular President of the Branch. After tea the usual business meeting was held under the genial control of the rev. gentleman above mentioned. After several new members (honorary and performing) had been admitted, it was unanimously decided to acquiesce in the request by the Association Secretary that the Publow band should be allowed to work with this branch. The election of officers for the ensuing year was then proceeded with. The retiring President (Rev. J. E. W. Honnywill) was unanimously re-elected to fill this office. He accepted the duties, and his decision was hailed with great acclamation. Mr. I. B. Holmyard was highly complimented on his work as hon. secretary, and was re-appointed. He thanked the members for the honour again conferred upon him, and said that his one aim would be, as it had always been, the best interests of them all as ringers, the interest and success of their branch, and also that of the Association at Votes of thanks were then cordially passed to the large. Thus ended another pleasant gathering, one more to be added to the many existing now only as memories in the minds of members of this Deanery Branch.

A CANTER TO CANTERBURY.

A little party of six—all parsons except one—set themselves down in the old cathedral town of Canterbury on Monday, May 1st, anxious to test some of the bells of East Kent after the manner of change-ringers. The Rev. F. J. O. Helmore had drawn up an attractive programme, and a start was made the same evening at St. Stephen's, Hackington, a good peal of Double Norwich coming round in just over three hours. Tuesday morning was labelled for Hythe, and here again the bells ran home, this time to a grand peal of Stedman Triples, conducted by the Master of the Oxford Guild. There was no time to spare for a pull at Folkestone, as practice at the Cathedral was down for the evening. A tour round the building before this, under the guidance of Miss Helmore, was greatly appreciated. Ospringe on Wednesday morning brought the first disappointment, Double Norwich coming to grief close on the finish. Then on to Faversham in the afternoon where Grandsire Triples was started for at a great speed, but this also proved a failure, so the rest of the time was devoted to practising Superlative and Double Norwich, two plain courses of the former and a short touch of the latter being brought round. The "heavy bell man" was at this point compelled to retrace his steps from Faversham homewards to Caversham, whilst the remainder of the party returned to headquarters and spent the evening happy in the possession of handbells. The existence of a performing cat as a diversion at mealtimes must not be forgotten. Thursday morning began with a rush for the train, but Birchington was reached safely, and Sted-man Triples came round here in fine style well under the three hours. Quex Park, the rendezvous for the afternoon and the last item on the programme, was marked out for Stedman Caters; a knowledge of the Railway Company's time table, however, blighted somewhat the work in hand, and two hours ringing was the utmost that could be achieved. Three peals out of six attempts, and nevertheless plenty of enjoyment and a great deal that was new and interesting to occupy the time during the four days.

The thanks of the visitors are recorded to the Rev. F. J. O. Helmore for all his excellent arrangements, and to those "men of Kent" who took part in the ringing at the various places.

HAULING A BELL UP THE MOUNT OF OLIVES.

Recently an interesting transport feat was performed in the Holy Land, when a huge bell, measuring 7 feet across its lower rim, and turning the scale at 6 tons, was successfully hauled up the steep and rough slopes of the Mount of Olives by a team of mules. It is one of a series of large bells for the new German hospice which was formally opened in April last. Curiously enough, it was twenty years ago that a similar feat was performed by Russian women. A huge bell had arrived at Jaffa for the Russian sanatorium on the Mount of Olives. It remained here two years, no one being willing to take the contract for bringing it up the rough cobblestone road from Jaffa, and especially up the steep and rough ascent of the Mount of Olives. At last an enthusiastic company of women-Russian pilgrims set themselves to dragging it up the mountains, and placing it at the base of the tower which had been waiting to receive it. It was a thrilling sight as this army of devotees passed along the rough mule track that then ran along the outside of the north wall of Jerusalem, tugging at the long rope by which they drew the sacred burden, going on with songs and rejoicings, and never giving up until the bell was at the summit of the Mount of Olives.

MACHEN, NEAR NEWPORT, MONMOUTHSHIRE.

The order has just been placed with Messrs. Llewellins and James, of Bristol, to rehang the existing ring of six bells, and to add a new treble, so as to complete the octave. The bells have been idle for many years, and would have been rehung; some months ago, but on the suggestion of the Hon. Secretary of the Llandaff.
Association, to complete the octave, it was deferred with good results.

In Memoriam.

HARVEY REEVES.

DIED MARCH 28TH, 1911.

AGED 69 YEARS.

In life we are too prone to judge our fellow-man according to our own light. Our various frames of mind cause us to criticise men and things by a standard set up by ourselves, making little or no allowance for the human weaknesses to which we all are only too liable. How few of us would care to be measured even by our own standard? In life we often say and think that which is uppermost in our minds. In Death—we draw the veil. As we stand within the darkened room, as we gaze at the coffined clay and muse o'er the unfathomable mystery, as millions have mused and will until the end of Time; all the frailties, all the infirmities, all the imperfections of our nature, with all its dross, sink out of sight, covered as with a mantle; but through it all shines the metal of the Man—the man at his best.

Harvey Reeves, Editor of "THE BELL NEWS," was born at Worcester on November 10th, 1841, being the only son of Charles Reeves, of that city. At an early age he made his way to the tower of All Saints, where hung a ring of ten bells. Under the tutelage of the celebrated James Burford he progressed, and ultimately rang his first peal there. This was followed by several others, rung during his apprenticeship at Messrs. Bayliss, Printers. At the age of twenty-three he left the faithful city for Tunbridge Wells. While situated there two opportunities were offered him in the ranks of journalism at one and the same time, at Cheltenham and London respectively. He chose the latter, and entered the establishment of Messrs. Waterlow. After fifteen years' service he joined the publishing house of Cassell and Co. At that time the journal "Church Bells"—now extinct—gave a page to ringing, and the remainder to church work. At the invitation of the late Canon Erskine Clarke, who was then proprietor, deceased undertook the control of the ringers' page, and from this connection evidently sprang the idea of an entire Ringers' Journal. During the seventies his ringing was therefore with the Londoners of the old school. His contemporaries were such celebrated men as Muskett, Dwight, Haley, Cox, Booth, Cooter, Wood and Murray Hayes. There lies before the writer a volume of "Church Bells" for 1872, and opened haphazard there is recorded in the ringing colums, Grandsire Caters rung by the St. James's Society at St. Clement Danes, Strand, composed and called by Harvey Reeves. In those days, every Sunday morning found him at Bethnal Green-the "Mecca" of many ringers now gone to dust. Another record is Grandsire Caters called by Geo. Dorrington at All Saints, Pop-

lar, in Lecember, 1871, the composition of H. Reeves, who rang in it. It was during these ringing excursions that friendships were formed, and one of them was with Mr. Henry Dains, another with Mr. Samuel Hayes of the College Youths. Both these veterans deeply deplore the demise of their friend who has now been called home. About 1880 the deceased decided to live in Walthamstow. There were then only eight bells, the present ten being an augmentation. Ringing at Walthamstow was at a very low ebb, but Harvey Reeves got a band together, taught them, and called their first peal. In all he had taken part in about 140 performances. In 1881 the idea of a ringers' paper took tangible form in the appearance of "THE BELL NEWS" as a monthly, To rescue ringing from the sporting press was uphill work, but it was done, and on April 8th, 1882, No. 1 vol. 1 as a weekly appeared. It was only a sheet of eight pages then, and the first number contained but six peals. Those six had some peculiar tained but six peals. characteristics. They read: The first of Double Norwich by the College Youths, with such men as R. Jameson, J. W. Rowbotham, R. French, C. F. Winney, F. E. Dawe, E. Horrex and M. Hayes. Another was called by the late George Newson; another by the late Henry Johnson; and yet another by the late Thomas Hattersley, of Sheffield. What impetus ringing journalism has had upon the ringing of peals can only be conjectured, but with the progress of the one was also the contemporary of the other.

The pioneers of any successful movement must necessarily stand out in bold relief. Theirs is not the reward. It is to posterity to give them their meed of gratitude. Broken down in health with cancer on the bladder, and bedridden for nearly a year, the deceased was obviously unable in his latter days to devote his mind and body to the work originated by him, and after a period of intense pain and suffering, Harvey Reeves passed to his rest in his 70th year.

No man's worth can be fairly measured in his day. It is only after full reflection of the difficulties that beset the path of a pioneer that judgment can be pronounced. In the years that are to come, it will be realised that the spadework of Harvey Reeves did much to add prestige to the Art of Ringing, and he was one of those content to be weighed in the balance—

"When he had passed from the earth and its toiling, To be only remembered by what he has done." R.I.P.




