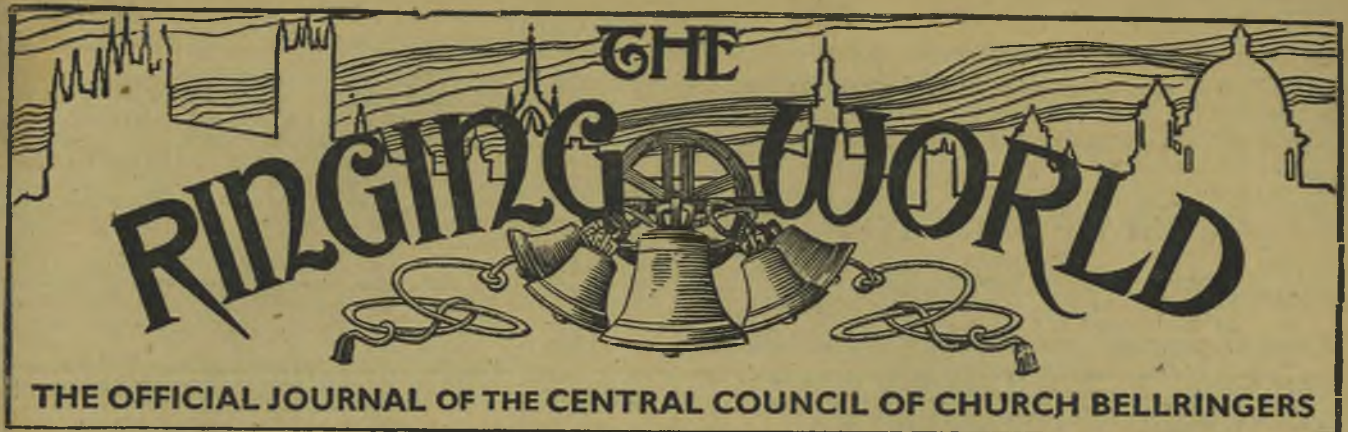

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UNDERSTANDING

The other man's viewpoint is constantly being exemplified. In the field of international politics some regard it as the basis of world peace; in industry it is the starting point towards team spirit; and among the all sorts and conditions of men who go towards forming the Church it is one of the secrets of unity. For example, the question might be asked, What is the price of coal? £4 a ton or more might be the answer. Through other spectacles the price is the mining village, the miners' homes, the conditions under which they live and work and the fatherless children.

True understanding will only be reached when we see the other side of the picture. The principle applies with equal force to ringers and parsons. Ringers are frequently reminded of their duty to the Church, and it is right that such talks and, if necessary, admonitions should be given. On the other hand mutual understanding will only be achieved if the parson succeeds in understanding the outlook of those in the belfry. The Rev. C. Carew Cox, in his notes as Master of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild, makes a timely observation on this subject. He writes:—

'I do want to appeal especially for a knowledgeable backing of their ringers' work by the clergy generally, and would dare to suggest that the incumbent of every affiliated tower should become at least an honorary member of the Guild, if not a ringer. Also, that he should, whenever possible, accompany his ringers to the quarterly and annual meetings of the branches. The proceedings at the business meetings do help to widen interest and give some insight into the technicalities of ringing, and every parish priest should qualify himself to some extent to appreciate the prowess of his ringers beyond just thinking of them, perhaps, as pulling the bells.'

There is a school of thought which advocates that affairs in the belfry go sweeter without the presence of the incumbent. We do not subscribe to that view. Ringers desire to rank as servants of the Church in the same manner as the choir, and they need their priest just as much as any other section of Church workers. Their pride in service to the Church takes a different footing if it is understood that it is not the mere 'pulling of bells.' The Gospel for St. Bartholomew's Day has this telling phrase: 'They that exercise authority upon them are called bene-

factors.' Yes we ringers want our priests to be benefactors—not in the financial sense, but in the spiritual sense; and the basis of benefaction is doubly increased when it is given with understanding.

The heartiest congratulations of the Exercise will go to Mr. Ernest Morris, of Leicester, who, after 41 years of ringing, reached the 1,000 peal mark last week. Mr. H. J. Poole, the conductor, tells us that the enthusiastic Morris insisted on getting the peal rung before he, Poole, left for a holiday!

Seventeen-year-old Mary E. Davis has reached 150 peals with the handbell peal of Grandsire Triples at Bournemouth on August 17th, and incidentally her first as conductor.

The peal of Grandsire Caters at Burton-on-Trent on August 22nd was Mr. J. T. Dyke's 600th peal. His first peal was rung at the same tower 38 years ago.

'Old Joe,' the Leicester Rhythm King on handbells, still retain his form, in spite of his 80 years, as he very forcibly demonstrated in the recent peal of Stedman Cinques.

The clock and chimes of St. Lawrence's, Surfleet, kindly given by the late Rupert Richardson, will be dedicated by Canon Carnegie, of Spalding, on September 7th, at 3.30 p.m. Ringing 2.30 and after service.

Had the peal attempt, which preceded the quarter-peal at Long Buckby, recently, been successful, it would have been the first peal on the bells, the only other attempt being in 1856, when unfortunately the 4th bell was turned over in the last 120.

In the columns of this journal is an appeal for the church bells of Hanslope, Bucks. About 18 months ago they were declared unsafe by the Church Council, and expert opinion advised that the bells be rehung, new fittings, new wheels and bell ropes provided; in fact, a complete overhaul. It was also decided to add two new bells, not recast the six into a ring of eight, in order to retain the individuality and depth of the bells. The cost will be in the neighbourhood of £750, but the Council have £500 in hand. The balance is needed.

BELFRY GOSSIP

The peal at Martin, Lincolnshire, marks the achievement of a years old scheme by the inhabitants of this small village to provide a peal of bells for their parish church. The church was built in 1876, a tower being added in 1911. Soon after this a bell fund was started, but it was left to the present Vicar, the Rev. J. T. Paddison, to bring the project to a successful conclusion. Only a small 'ting-tang' had been available for all purposes since the church was built, until the new bells were dedicated on June 7th this year by the Ven. K. Lamplugh, Arch-deacon of Lincoln.

The bells are a fine ring of six by Messrs. Taylor and Co., and are hung in a massive iron frame designed for eight bells. The tower being only about 9ft. square, the frame has had to be constructed in two tiers, the 5th bell and the two empty pits being in the upper portion. As there were no ringers in the village, an entirely new band has been formed, including three girls of school age, and instruction is being given weekly by ringers from the neighbouring tower of Blankney. Good progress is being made, and it is hoped that the bells will be rung by an entirely local band before the retirement of the Vicar in a few weeks' time.

To celebrate the eightieth birthday of Mr. Harrison Smith, ringer for over fifty years at Wickhambreaux Church, Kent, Frank Ellen 1, Jack Walter 2, Sidney Walter 3, Percy W. Smith 4, Edward Wood 5, and Stanley White (conductor) 6, rang a quarter-peal of Minor, 1,260 changes, on Aug. 21st. In spite of a recent serious operation, Mr. Smith continues to ring short 'touches.' He has an excellent record of service to the Kent County Association, and particularly to the Canterbury District, where for a number of years he held office as district representative. His many ringing friends will wish him well.

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ERNEST MORRIS ACHIEVES AMBITION

SIXTEENTH 1,000-PEAL MAN

Fifty-eight-year-old Ernest Morris, of Leicester, now joins the ranks of those ringers who have rung 1,000 peals. Only 15 men before him have achieved this feat, and of these, five, James Bennett, Frank Bennett, Alfred H. Pulling, James George and George Williams are alive. The last two are no longer active peal ringers.

It has taken Mr. Morris 41 years to fulfil this ambition; in August, 1906, he rang his first peal at St. Andrew's, Grimsby, and on August 28th his thousandth, a handbell peal of Stedman Cinques in St. Margaret's Church, Leicester, to which he has been attached all his life. His father, that grand old man Josiah Morris, rang with him in his first, and with him in this, his latest.

As a boy, Ernest Morris, who was born in Leicester on July 28th, 1889, was not content to simply ring for services and an occasional peal. He wanted to know who made the bells, how they were cast, in fact, all about them. Numerous articles and books are the result. Morris wanted to be able to ring any kind of bell, large or small, good going or bad, and in any method and on any number. His record shows how he carried out this ambition, how he tackled some very tough propositions in remote country places where the bells were deemed impossible, sometimes going two or three times until he got through. With the exception of three only, Morris has rung a full peal on all the possible bells in his own native county. Peals at 125 churches in his native shire is a number not reached by any other ringer in any one county, and this includes 49 first peals on the bells.

Mr. Morris is well known as a conductor, and his first peal as such was at Melton Mowbray, where he called Grandsire Triples in May, 1908. He has rung and conducted peals on all numbers of bells from five to twelve, and he is a ringer who thinks as much of assisting in a peal of Doubles as he does a peal of Maximus.

HIS RECORDS AND LITERARY WORK.

Morris has taken part in many record lengths, including conducting the longest by the Midland Counties Association of Doubles (6,600), Minor (7,200 and 10,080), Bob Major (7,008 and 13,440), Kent Treble Bob (10,912) and Oxford Treble Bob (7,840). He also conducted the longest lengths of Bob Major by Central Northants Association, one of 7,488, and another of 9,760 with 400 singles. He called the record peals of Little Bob (6,720), Little Canterbury (6,720), Spliced Treble Bob (Ilkeston arrangement, 9,120), and rang in 9,600 Kent and Oxford Spliced. He also took part in the record peals of Cambridge Major (7,008 and 12,896), and the recent record 12,663 Stedman Cinques at Oxford Cathedral.

He called the quickest tower-bell peal ever rung, a 5,040 Cambridge Minor in 1 hour 50 minutes; and also the only 'Ernest' peal. He has rung peals with four sets of brothers, four fathers and sons, and five fathers and sons, while his handbell peals range from Doubles to Maximus and include the lightest and heaviest sets ever rung. His peals have been spread over 219 towers in 24 counties for 25 associations and guilds.

It is, however, not only in peal ringing that Mr. Morris has done some excellent work. He served the Midland Counties Association as its honorary secretary from 1925 until it was divided into Diocesan Guilds in 1945. He is now vice-president of the Leicester Guild and acts as consultant for bells on the Advisory Committee for the Leicester Diocese.

With a penchant for historical research, Mr. Morris has a complete record of every bell in Leicestershire and all historic facts known of them. He has completely revised and corrected North's book up to date, and it is hoped that this will be printed as soon as the paper

crisis permits. He is the author of a 'Chronology of British Bell Founders' and many historic articles on other subjects, but he is, of course, best known to ringers as the author of 'History and Art of Change Ringing' and 'Legends of the Bells,' two volumes of great interest and value. He has in the publisher's hands a new work entitled 'Bells of All Nations,' which covers every type of bell in all lands.

He transcribed all the ancient baptismal, marriage and burial registers of St. Margaret's, where he is now Parish Clerk and Clerk of the Vestry, and for this and other works was made a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society. He is a member of the Johnsonian Society.

Latest is the contribution of an illustrated article on bells for the new edition of Chambers' 'Encyclopedia' and others to the B.B.C., Apollo Magazine, Nautical Magazine, Mecano Magazine and many journals on subjects as widely removed as horse brasses, fire backs, door knockers and, of course, 'Bells.' The art of illuminated design Mr. Morris taught himself, and this has enabled him to write peal tablets and peal books.

And all this has been achieved with one eye. Ernest Morris has been blind in the right eye from birth. Following is a list of the 1,000 peals.

Ringling and Music

CONDUCTOR ANSWERS.

Dear Sir,—Why the peal of Kent Treble Bob Minor rung at Elland, Yorks, brings to Mr. V. A. Jarrett's mind the correspondence of the Basingstoke peal I cannot imagine. Musically incorrect or not, the calling was true, and, most important to me as conductor, the striking was of the best.

The ringers' ropes were as tight in the last seven twenty as the first.

The light six were chosen for the benefit of two young ringers attempting their first peal, and the smiles of happiness which lit up their faces when they heard 'This is all' amply rewarded the efforts of Mr. F. Linfoot and myself.

This is not the first nor the last peal which has been rung on the front six at Elland, and if at any time it was deleted from the records of the Association, it will still be seen recorded on a peal board in the bell chamber of St. Mary's, Elland.

The tenor is 15 cwt. 3 qr. in F, the fifth is odd struck, the sixth rope slips the wheel if not kept tight, and the seventh is apt to drop when ringing. In the light of the above stated faults, these bells cannot be truly termed an excellent ring of bells.—Yours truly,

Dear Sir,—I was surprised to read Mr. Jarrett's letter on the musical demerits of the Elland peal, and was more than surprised when he stated that our bells were an excellent ring of eight and should provide no difficulty for a Minor peal on the back six. This is contrary to the opinion of many local ringers, whose considered judgment I have every reason to respect, and who for years have been telling me that the tenors run badly.

I can assure Mr. Jarrett that I considered which six would be best to ring before we started the peal, and decided on the light six in the interests of (1) good striking, which to my way of thinking is the major point next to the truth of the peal; (2) of the comfort of the ringers; and (3) in consideration for the ringer of the 3rd, who on the back six would be ringing the odd-struck 5th, and who incidentally is a young first pealer of 15 years. We started with the hope of ringing a good peal, well struck, and we were highly satisfied with our performance.

OBITUARY

MR. E. D. TAYLOR.

Bells of Loughborough's memorial carillon on August 28th sounded the sombre tones of Chopin's Funeral March as a token of homage to one of the world's foremost bell founders, Mr. Edmund Denison Taylor, whose death occurred on the same day at Loughborough, at the age of 83.

Mr. Taylor, whose home was at Buckland, Burton Walk, Loughborough, had been ill for about a week in a local nursing home.

A great-grandson of Mr. Robert Taylor, who founded the firm of Messrs. John Taylor and Co., the Loughborough bell founders, Mr. Denison Taylor took an active interest in the business for the greater part of his life, and even up to the time of his death concerned himself with its progress.

MR. T. LOFTHOUSE.

By the death of Mr. Tom Lofthouse, people's warden and ringer at Chorley Parish Church, the church has lost one of its most willing workers. Mr. Lofthouse, who was 68 years of age, had been ill for some time, but his death in hospital on August 15th was unexpected. He had taken part in ringing for both morning and evening services the previous Sunday.

Tom, as he was called, had been a ringer for over fifty years, and a member of the Lancashire Association for 40 years. He was one of the few practising ringers who were in the 'old Lancashire Six-Bell Association.' Though not a great peal ringer—he rang only seven—he took part in the only local peal in Chorley.

As a young man he was a Sunday School teacher, and later chairman of the Bible Class, sidesman and for the last 12 years people's warden. He was a member of the parish committees and at times was on the Church Council.

Prior to the interment in the local cemetery, a service was held at the Parish Church, a large congregation of his friends and fellows being present to pay their respects to one who was described by the Rector of Chorley, in his words of appreciation, as an honest Christian gentleman. Before the service the whole pull and stand was rung 68 times and then a touch of Stedman Triples by the following: F. Rigby, T. Barker, F. G. Bradley, H. Southworth, Ruth Bradley, A. Rigby, A. Tomlinson and A. Hatch. F. R.

MR. A. PRESTIDGE.

His many friends will hear with regret of the death of Mr. Albert Prestidge, who until 1936, when ill-health forced his retirement, was for over 37 years a ringer and for upwards of 30 years the leader of St. Andrew's Parish Church, Netherton, ringers. Mr. Prestidge died at his residence on August 10th after a long and painful illness. He was one of the oldest members of the Worcestershire and Districts Association and the Dudley and District Guild, and a life member of the Society for the Archdeaconry of Stafford.

As a tribute to his memory a quarter-peal of Stedman Triples, composed by James George, was rung by the following ringers: Thomas A. Townsend, H. Hill, H. Hubball, Miss M. Tromans, H. J. Shuck, L. Clissett, W. Davies (conductor) and L. Prestidge.

MR. O. J. SMART.

The Andover District of the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild has suffered a severe loss in the death, after a short illness, of Oscar James Smart, Ringing Master for 16 years and steeple captain of Andover Parish Church for even longer. As Ringing Master he was untiring in his efforts to promote the art in his district, and many in and around Andover owe their knowledge of ringing to his kindly and patient instruction. The funeral service on August 23rd was conducted by the Rector, the Rev. R. A. C. Fletcher, assisted by the Rev. S. A. Gidlow, chairman of the district. The bells, which had recently been rehung, were rung fully muffled in his honour.

AN APPRECIATION

Members of the West Norfolk Branch of the Norwich Diocesan Association assembled at their meeting at Caston on Saturday last, stood in silence on hearing the news of the passing of John Arthur Godfrey, a former chairman and Ringing Master of the branch.

Elected a member of the Norwich Association in 1899, Mr. Godfrey was known to every ringer in Norfolk, he having lived in turn at Yarmouth, Cromer, Fakenham, Cawston, Dereham and Gressenhall. His first peal was also the first peal on Gorleston bells, then a peal of six, on April 11th, 1901, and altogether Mr. Godfrey had taken part in about 180 peals, 167 of which were for the Norwich Association—10 of them being on handbells.

John Godfrey was a great enthusiast and a great friend. He taught numbers of ringers, was diligent at his church on Sundays and would go anywhere at a moment's notice to assist in any special ringing or to take part in a peal attempt. He was a good striker, on six bells especially, where he was particularly 'at home.' He was rarely absent from meetings and never without a happy smile and a cheery greeting for everybody.

From 1934-9 he was the efficient Ringing Master of the branch, and then became chairman, an office he relinquished in 1944 owing to failing health. Recently he had gone to live with his son at Caythorpe, Lincolnshire, where he died on August 19th, aged 73. He will be much missed in the Norwich Diocese. N. G.
